

Message from Mayor Chris Brown

The City of Morris sits at an exciting crossroads. As I write this letter, a new water tower is under construction, a new fire department building has broken ground, and the preliminary work

on a new housing development is under way. Along with the housing development, one of the most exciting and significant additions to our city in its history will soon break ground. After years of hard work, fundraising, and planning, the new Morris YMCA will be breaking ground in just a matter of days. These projects will serve our community for decades and promise to take our community into a promising, bright future.

The excitement does not end with these projects. Truly, they serve as a beginning and a foundation for more to come. As we look to the west side of Morris and see the promising beginnings of a new subdivision and YMCA. do not forget to focus your gaze on our city parks. They too, will soon be the focus of a transformational change that will make them the crown jewels in our parks system. With the recently adopted City of Morris Parks Master Plan, we have what will serve as a blueprint for future upgrades and improvements to our parks. Goodwill Park and McKinley Park have been selected as the parks most in need of attention. Our plan calls for Goodwill to be completed this year and thanks to a \$600,000 OSLAD Grant that was recently awarded to the City of Morris, West Side Park will be upgraded

next year with new ball fields, skate park, pickleball courts, playground, and many other exciting features which will marry it perfectly with the YMCA development next year. The improvements to West Side Park must be done next year due to the parameters and requirements placed on the grant which is through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Following the completion at West Side Park, McKinley Park will be the next on our list for a complete remodel. Our current plans call for a new basketball court, pickleball courts, batting cages, pavilion, and playground equipment.

Improving our parks and our residents' quality of life is and will continue to be a top priority in our administration. The future of our outdoor spaces and facilities will be unrecognizable after our work is completed.

As a city, we closed out our fiscal year and entered a new one on May 1st. I want to express my appreciation and say thank you to our City Clerk, Lori Werden, for her countless hours spent on our budget for fiscal year 2023/2024. As we closed out the fiscal year and entered into a new year, the General Fund revenues were \$2.5 million above budget estimates, and our expenses were \$1.5 million under budget estimates. Let me say that again, revenues were above budget and expenses were below budget. Combined, it is a \$4 million swing in the right direction. The total of all fund balances was estimated to be about \$10.5 million, at year end, but the reality is that all fund balances were over \$27 million for the end of the fiscal year. I am happy to report that our city continues to sit


in a healthy and strong financial position. I would like to thank our city council and all our employees that helped make that happen.



PUBLIC WORKS POINTERS

Mosquito Abatement

With the arrival of summer, we welcome warm weather, swimming, cookouts, and unfortunately, mosquitos. The Morris Public Works Department does have a mosquito spraying schedule to help with eliminating as many of our pesky summer visitors as possible. When spraying becomes necessary, the schedule is broken into three sections: south, middle, and north. The south portion is comprised of the area south of the



railroad tracks and extending west to include Hatcher's Woods. This area is sprayed on Sunday nights. The middle route is the area north of the railroad tracks to West Route 6. The middle route is sprayed on Tuesday nights. Finally, the north route is everything north of West Route 6 to Gore Road. This route is fogged on Thursday nights. If there is a chance for rain or windy conditions, the scheduled person will usually fog the night before or after the regularly scheduled evening. Any changes to the schedule through the summer will be added to the City of Morris website and Facebook page. Have a safe and happy summer!


Community Shred Event



The City of Morris has partnered with ProShred for a community wide paper shredding event on Saturday, June 10th from 9:00am – 11:00pm at Morris City Hall. Customer service

professionals will put documents into secure containers which are then mechanically lifted and dumped into the shredder in a virtually touch-free process. A closed circuit monitor then shows the destruction of the documents. There is a 2-bank box limit and there is no charge to residents.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

It is summer and that means it's time for time around the outdoor firepit with friends and family. The best way to enjoy an outdoor campfire starts with keeping everybody safe. A fire of any kind demands serious attention to safety.

One of the most important decisions to make about fire pit safety is determining where to place a fire pit. Choose a level spot, especially with portable fire pits or fire bowls. Ideally, a fire pit should be at least 10 feet away from any structures — 20 feet is even better. This includes your house, shed, fence and neighboring yards.

Check the area around and above your fire pit. You don't want any plants within 10 feet of the fire pit area. Trim overhanging branches that could become a fire risk, especially with stray sparks from a wood-burning fire pit. Surround your fire pit with non-combustible materials, like crushed stone, brick, or sand. It's best to remove any vegetation, even lawn.

Here are some additional safety tips to follow regarding fire pit safety:

- · Check wind direction before lighting a fire.
- · Don't use flammable fluids (gasoline, lighter fluid, etc.) to light or relight fires.
- · Don't wear flammable clothing (like nylon) or any loose-fitting clothing.
- · Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the fire.
- Avoid using soft woods like pine or cedar because they can pop and throw sparks.
- · Keep a fire extinguisher, garden hose or bucket of water nearby.
- · Keep chairs a safe distance from the fire.
- · Never leave a fire unattended.

know you can put your home on extra patrol while you're gone? It's easy! If you live in the city limits, Call Katie at 815-941-5233 and request to have your residence placed on house check. She will need your address, the dates you will be gone, and emergency contact information.

In addition, please follow these simple rules to help protect yourself and your home from becoming the target of burglars.

- · Stop your mail and have your family or friends retrieve it for you.
- · Set a light on a timer inside your home to create the appearance of activity inside.
- · Exterior motion sensor light can aid in deterring crime.
- · Consider installing a camera system before leaving if you don't have one already.
- Avoid hiding spare keys outside of your home.
 Instead, leave them with a neighbor, friend, or family member.
- · Let your neighbors know you're away.
- Do not post your vacation plans on social media.
 The wrong person might see your vacation post and decide that while you're away, your home is prime for plundering! Post your vacation photos after you safely arrive home.
