Message from Mayor Chris Brown

In the summer newsletter, I spoke to you about the exciting new developments that are happening across our city. The groundbreaking was held for the new YMCA, a new water tower is nearing

completion, and Goodwill Park will soon be under construction with major renovations on the way. I was so excited to discuss the transformational change we are experiencing at the State of the City Address in June. In addition to these exciting projects, I was so pleased to also report on the financial health of our city. I know we are still early in our administration, but I feel it is imperative that we set the tone early for responsible spending and budget awareness. Continuing to come in above budget with revenues and below budget for spending is vital for us as we move towards the future.

Revenues are surging for our city due to the fact that we are now becoming a destination for visitors. We have known for a long time as residents that Morris is a great place to live, but now I think we're all realizing it's also a great place to visit for the day or weekend. This is not happening by accident. It has been my belief since day one that increasing our events and enhancing our existing events would not only improve the quality of life for Morris' residents, but it would also expand the foundation of sales tax revenue that is the life blood of any community.

Because of the increase in revenue and controlled, strategic spending, I am proud to report we were able to lower the tax levy once again to the historic low rate of .6193. This is down from .6568 a year ago and .6656 two years ago. Our approach of boosting and expanding our sales tax base helps to ease the tax burden placed on our residents. We will continue to focus on opportunities to expand our sales tax revenue so we can continue to lower the amount of taxes placed on property owners in Morris.

Lastly, I'd like to take just a moment to shine a light of appreciation on the people that work together to make the Grundy County Corn Festival the biggest and best event of the year. First, I must tip my cap to the Corn Festival Committee and their volunteers that work all year round and dedicate their time during the festival to make sure we all have an enjoyable, fun time. I would also like to thank our city staff for their efforts as well. The Morris Public Works Department are there for the set up and they are there for the clean-up long after the fun-loving crowds have gone home for the weekend. We get to wake up, go downtown and question whether or not a festival actually took place. Finally, we all owe a debt of gratitude to the Morris Police Department for keeping everyone safe throughout the weekend. Not only do they provide an inperson presence to ensure everyone's safety, but they also work countless hours behind the scenes planning and preparing for every case scenario imaginable. Like all of our successes at the City of Morris, it is truly a team effort that makes the Corn Festival the success that it is. Thank you to all the women and men that play a part in making it happen. I'll see you there!

Free Leaf Bag Pickup • Saturday, October 7th

The City of Morris will be distributing free leaf bags to residents in Upper Goold Park on Saturday, October 7th from 8:00am to 12:00pm or until supplies last. There is a 10-bag limit per household. In case of rain, the giveaway will be held at Morris Public Works which is located at 319 W. River Road.

Yard Waste Pickup with Republic Services

Republic Services will continue to pick up unlimited

leaf and yard waste with your regular garbage collection through the last full week of November (November 19th – 25th). Yard waste should be placed in an approved lawn and leaf bag or the garbage container which has the "Yard Waste Only" sticker. Any changes to this schedule will be posted on the City of Morris Facebook page.



City Continues to Exchange Water Meters

The City of Morris would like to make residents aware of their ongoing water meter exchange program. Meters are exchanged at no cost



to residents and service calls typically are completed in less than twenty minutes.



With the new smart meters, residents can download an app for their mobile devices which allows

them to monitor their water usage. Use of this type of technology can make the detection of a water leak much easier and can potentially save customers costs related to water usage caused by leaks. FIRE SAFETY TIPS

National Fire Prevention Week is October 8th – 14th. One simple thing you can do to keep you and your family safe is keeping up to date with your smoke detectors. Regularly check and maintain your smoke detectors. Smoke detectors are your first line of defense against fires, providing early warning and precious time to escape. Test your smoke detectors monthly to ensure they are functioning correctly. Replace batteries at least once a year, or as soon as you hear the low-battery warning beep. Additionally, remember to replace smoke detectors every 10 years to ensure optimal performance. Having properly functioning smoke detectors throughout your home significantly increases the chances of early fire detection and helps save lives.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT SPOTLIGHT: THE BEST IS YET TO COME

Economic development encompasses the way our community feels to those living in it and those who visit. It's partnering to reach a mutual goal. It's supporting our neighbors through good times and challenges, being loyal to our businesses, and encouraging bold vision and progress. And we are doing it all very well here in Morris.

Through the hard work of many nonprofit organizations, the summer welcomed tens of thousands to Goold Park to enjoy music in the bandshell, movies under the stars, swimming at the City pool, and much more. In June, Fforest Fest brought nationally known bands, vintage vendors, and a food truck rally, followed by the 33rd annual Dulcimer Fest- a weekend of hammered instrument workshops and performances. A week later, 31 Midwestern competitors arrived with their rigs to compete in the 2nd Annual Rhythm and BBQ Fest. In August, the Morris Police Department and Grundy County Health Department brought the community together for the first National Night Out in 20 years. The Morris Area Public Library partnered to turn the park into a free movie theater one Friday a month, utilizing the City's new outdoor projector.

Downtown Morris remained the place to be on the second Saturday of the month. The 3 French Hens Country Market returned Downtown in May, with a new location nestled in the heart of our small business community. Shoppers and vendors are raving about the move, and our retail community has seen incredible sales. As the market concludes, Morris Cruise Night takes to the streets. Volunteers have welcomed an average of 856 show cars while raising thousands for local charities. Although Downtown is normally quiet on Sundays, the



Morris Retail Association's Rock the Block series filled the streets with music, dancing, food trucks, and shopping. The 9th annual Liberty Arts Festival elevated art in all its forms. The free event drew 45 Illinois artists to demonstrate their craft along with 6 live music, dance and



drum performances, a Children's Village where kids could play and create, a show by the Morris Watercolor Guild, art exhibits at the Grundy Area Historical Museum, and Sip 'N Shop with 20 Downtown businesses participating. On event comment cards, visitors praised our hospitality, community spirit, and appreciation for art here in Morris.

As we turn to fall, the Morris Beer Fest will bring thousands to enjoy Goold Park and the whole city will come alive as friends gather and visitors experience the 74th Grundy County Corn Festival. The Morris Retail Association invites you to its new Witches Night Out shopping event October 20th, followed by the family-friendly Boo Fest on the 21st. After the turkey is put away, we'll drape the streets in garland and welcome Santa to kick off our beloved Home for the Holidays November 24th-26th.

Events do so much more than ring the registers for a day or two; they set the tone for those looking to live, work, and invest in our community. In our work with new businesses - from industrial development at the Brisbin Road interchange to new retail and services eyeing our Downtown quality of life is always a differentiating factor and

a reason many choose to put their flag in the ground in Morris.

To all those promoting, supporting, investing in, and volunteering for the betterment of our city, we see you and we thank you. With your partnership, the best is yet to come!


