By the time this newsletter is published, our community will have already hosted the Rough Road 100 bike race, Morris Women's



On top of the offerings in Goold Park, Downtown Morris will be hopping all summer long with Morris Cruise Night, 3 French Hens Market. Concerts on the Courthouse Lawn, and Rock the Block will be back again for concerts in June, July, and August. The list doesn't stop there, shopping events, the Liberty Arts Festival, Anybody 5K, and numerous library events also will be offered for all to enjoy. It is just astonishing that we can host such an amazing array of events in our community and I tip my cap and offer my sincere appreciation to all those involved working to bring joy and happiness into our lives. Thank you for all you do to make Morris such a wonderful place to visit and call home.

## **PUBLIC WORKS POINTERS**

With the arrival of summer, we welcome warm weather, swimming, cookouts, and unfortunately, mosquitos. The Morris Public Works Department does have a mosquito spraying schedule to help with eliminating as many of our pesky summer visitors as possible. Spraying began earlier this year than years past due to warm temperatures and greater than normal precipitation. The schedule is broken into three sections: south, middle, and north. The south portion is comprised of the area south of the railroad tracks and extending west to include



Hatcher's Woods. This area is sprayed on Sunday nights. The middle route is the area north of the railroad tracks to West Route 6. The middle route is sprayed on Thursday nights. Finally, the north route is everything north of West Route 6 to Gore Road. This route is fogged on Tuesday nights. If there is a chance of rain or windy conditions, the fogging will take place the night before or after. Any changes to the schedule through the summer will be added to the City of Morris website and Facebook page.

# FISCAL FOCUS

As we enter a new fiscal year, I am pleased to report to you on the financial health of our city. Morris continues to find itself in a strong financial position. I can say this with confidence, and I appreciate the hard work of this administration and our city council members who took the time to sit down with me and go through this budget line by line to make sure we are all on the same page and focused on continued financial responsibility. With all that said, I was proud to put forth the first city budget with a surplus since 2011/2012. The words "budget surplus" are music to the ears of any budget director. But once again, it comes from a team effort by the entire city administration led by Mayor Brown. Our sales tax revenues have increased by 35% since 2021 and overall, our revenues across the board have increased almost 44% since 2021. Coupled with controlled spending I am also pleased to announce that Morris had an estimated \$29.7 million across all funds as of April 20th, 2024, and approximately \$6.1 million in the general fund. Those numbers represent a 21% increase across all funds and a whopping 49% increase in the general fund respectively.

#### FIRE SAFETY TIPS

There is nothing like outdoor grilling. It is one of my favorite ways to cook food and I'm sure that I am not the only person I know with that opinion. But, before we head into the backyard and start the grilling season, we need to think about fire safety and the proper way to set up and

use our grills. A grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries and can also start fires. Follow these simple tips and you will be on your way to a safe grilling season.

#### SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

#### CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid.
   Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

## VISITORS EMBRACE EVENTS, BUSINESS BENEFITS

"We saw what's happening and want to be here" is a recurring theme when a business talks about choosing Morris. From larger companies that have expanded-like job producer Costco, whose Morris location is now tied for the top hot dog packaging facility in their nationwide fleet- to small businesses like the new Liberty Street Jewelers located Downtown, the sentiment is the same. Morris' culture has been cultivated for decades. Now it's coming into its own and garnering attention from outsiders.

One source of economic excitement is our 60+ special events. Cruise nights, concerts, festivals, races, themed shopping nights, and community events offer reasons for everyone to enjoy Morris. Spring kicked off with the Rough Road 100 gravel bike race, drawing 737 cyclists to our community. They hailed from eight states and cities spanning from Wilmette to Effingham. These visitors filled Morris hotels and also purchased gas, dined in our restaurants, and shopped in our stores on their quest to ride rural Grundy and LaSalle County roads. The event raised funds for We Care of Grundy County, impacting our community's most vulnerable residents as a result. Photos from the Morris event have made their way to national publications.







The Morris Retail Association's Girls Night Out/Cinco de Mayo event drew ladies (and gents) from surrounding towns to shop, dine, and enjoy Downtown. It kicked off an intense event season for retailers, which will include the popular 3 French Hens Market on the second Saturday of the month from May through October. The market returned to Downtown Morris last year after a hiatus, finding a perfect home in the parking lots behind 402 Liberty Street.

As outlined in the Mayor's letter, summer will welcome a full line up of events in Goold Park hosted by nonprofit organizations, each benefitting worthy local causes. With its picturesque 22-acre setting and large bandshell, the park will host an estimated 25,000 residents and visitors for a variety of public and private events throughout the summer and fall. We have now circulated more than 10,000 of our four-panel special event rack cards locally, and in hotels and travel destinations throughout Northern Illinois

While the energy in Morris is apparent anecdotally, the proof is in the numbers. The City's fiscal year '23 closed strong on all fronts and reflected a 35% increase in sales tax revenue since 2021- even as businesses and households continue to recover from the pandemic.

"There's more to Morris" is not just a marketing tagline, but a fitting manta for our City. There is more heart, more pride, and more dedication in our community. We welcome those with like minds to be a part of it.

## **GRUNDY MOVES TRANSPORTATION PLAN**

The Grundy Moves Transportation Plan is now available online. This first of it's kind Multimodal transportation plan for Grundy County evaluates existing and future needs of the county transportation network. The Purpose of the plan is to identify potential transportation improvement projects and investment priorities that address transportation needs while maintaining the quality-of-life Grundy County residents continue to enjoy. This study was led by the Grundy County Economic Development Council (GEDC) with additional support from the villages of Mazon, Minooka, Channahon,

# WEST SIDE PARK GROUNDBREAKING



The City of Morris announced the closure of West Side Park on Monday, March 18, 2024, to make way for major improvements and upgrades to the current facility. In March 2023, Morris was awarded \$600,000 from the Open Space Land Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) program, which is administered by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Along with matching funds from the City of Morris, West Side Park will see a number of new additions and upgrades added to the existing space it occupies.

Once completed, West Side Park will feature an additional ball diamond, pickleball courts, new playground equipment, bean bag courts, a picnic pavilion, and a completely redesigned skate park. Construction will continue through the

rest of the year and should be completed in early
