PUBLIC WORKS POINTERS

Free Leaf Bag Pickup • Saturday, October 3rd

The City of Morris will be distributing free leaf bags to residents in Upper Goold Park on Saturday, October 3rd from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM or until supplies last. There is a 10-bag limit per household. In case of rain, the giveaway will be held at the Morris Public Works building located at 1420 N. Ashley Road.



E-Recycling • Saturday, October 3rd



The Grundy County Land Use Department is hosting an electronic recycling and paper shredding event on Saturday, October 3rd from 8 AM to 12 PM at the Grundy County Administration Building located at 1320 Union Street. The city will not be hosting their previously scheduled e-recycling event on Friday, October 16th at First America. Yard Waste Pickup with Republic Services

Republic Services will continue to pick up unlimited leaf and yard waste with your regular garbage collection through the last full week of November (*November 23rd – 28th due to the Thanksgiving holiday*). Yard waste should be placed in an approved lawn and leaf bag or garbage container which has the “Yard Waste Only” sticker. Any changes to this schedule will be posted on the City of Morris Facebook page.



Burning Yard Waste Prohibited Within City Limits



The City of Morris prohibits the open burning of any yard waste which includes leaves, grass, brush, Christmas trees, tree clippings and other materials accumulated as a result of the maintenance of lawns and gardens. City ordinance states it is: “Unlawful for any person to burn or cause the combustion of any landscape waste or yard waste at any time within the corporate limits of the City of Morris.” Yard waste burning significantly worsens air quality and the smoke can irritate the eyes, nose, throat and lungs, especially for those with a pre-existing condition. Please consider alternatives like the following:

- Curbside pickup in an approved bag or yard waste bin
- Morris Public Works collects bundled branches when placed curbside
- Composting or mulching is a great way to recycle green materials like lawn waste

CHIEF CHAT

As we welcome another fall season, we're also looking forward to one of Morris' favorite traditions, the Grundy County Corn Festival. Each year, thousands of residents and visitors come together to enjoy the parade, carnival, live entertainment, great food, and everything our downtown has to offer. Keeping those events safe is one of the Morris Police Department's highest priorities.

Our officers spend months preparing for Corn Festival and other large community events. We work closely with our local, county, state, and federal public safety partners to develop detailed safety plans, coordinate staffing, and review best practices so everyone can enjoy the festivities in a safe environment. While much of that work happens behind the scenes, it's all done with one goal in mind: protecting our community.

As you enjoy Corn Festival, please remember that alcohol and pets are not permitted within the downtown festival area during the event. Your cooperation helps keep the festival safe and enjoyable for everyone.

We also ask everyone to remember one simple message: If you see something, say something. During an event that attracts thousands of people, you know what looks normal, and what doesn't. If you notice suspicious activity, unattended bags, unsafe behavior, or anything else that seems out of the ordinary, don't hesitate to notify an officer or call the Morris Police Department. We'd much rather investigate something that turns out to be nothing than miss an opportunity to prevent a serious incident.

The Morris Police Department continues to invest in technology that helps us respond more quickly and investigate incidents more effectively. Technology such as cameras and drones assist officers gather critical information when every second counts. In addition, partnerships with residents and businesses strengthen our ability to keep Morris safe.

Thank you for doing your part to help make our community a safe and welcoming place. We look forward to seeing you this fall and wish everyone a fun, memorable, and safe Corn Festival.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Fire Prevention Week: October 4–10, 2026

Each October, communities across the country observe National Fire Prevention Week to raise awareness about fire safety and help families reduce the risk of home fires. This year's theme, "Charge into Fire Safety: Safe Charging Is a Superpower," highlights the importance of safely charging lithium-ion batteries found in phones, laptops, power tools, e-bikes, scooters, and many other everyday devices.

To help prevent battery fires, always use the charger provided with your device or one approved by the manufacturer. Charge devices on a hard, flat surface, not on beds, couches, or under pillows where heat can build up. If a battery becomes unusually hot, begins to swell, emits smoke, or has a strange odor, stop using it immediately. Once a device is fully charged, unplug it rather than leaving it connected for extended periods.

Fall Fire Safety Tips

As temperatures cool, it's a great time to prepare your home for the season. Have your furnace inspected before cold weather arrives and always use fireplaces safely by never leaving a wood-burning fire unattended. If you're using a backyard fire pit, place it on a level surface at least 20 feet away from homes, garages, decks, fences, or other structures.

When Daylight Saving Time ends this fall, remember to replace the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and test each alarm to ensure it is working properly. Keep your smoke alarms up to date, they are your family's first line of defense in a fire. Just as important, create and practice a home fire escape plan so everyone knows how to get out safely if a fire occurs.

Seasonal Safety Reminders

Fall yard work also brings additional safety concerns. Clean up fallen leaves to help prevent slips and falls and use extra caution when cleaning gutters. Always place your ladder on stable ground at about a 75-degree angle, and have another person hold the ladder while you climb whenever possible.

Residents are also reminded that burning landscape waste or yard waste, including leaves, is prohibited at all times within the City of Morris. Properly dispose of leaves through approved collection or composting methods instead of burning them.

THE LIBERTY STREET RENOVATION WILL SPAN FROM STOREFRONT TO STOREFRONT AND AIMS TO ADDRESS UTILITIES, HANDICAP ACCESSIBILITY, AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

The future of downtown Morris may begin with reimagining its most familiar street.

Liberty Street, the main thoroughfare through our historic downtown shopping and dining

district, needs renovation. Rebuilding the road and removing the crown in the center presents an opportunity to address longstanding infrastructure issues and integrate modern amenities. The downtown ecosystem includes many layers; it is home to businesses, historic properties, special events, public space and more. Therefore, community engagement is central to planning and prioritizing work on Liberty Street.

While the project has been in discussions for years, a competitive grant is helping bring it to fruition. With support from the Grundy County Chamber of Commerce & Industry and Morris Restaurant & Retail Association, the City of Morris received a Rebuild Downtown and Main Streets grant from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity in summer 2025. The grant will help fund streetscape improvements identified in the Downtown Master Plan adopted by the city in 2020. The plan includes bump outs at four intersections, which create room for seating, plants, and outdoor dining, while improving pedestrian safety. Construction of these new assets presents a chance to modernize utilities above and below ground, beautify the historic district, and bring the area to Americans with Disability Act (ADA) standards so it is accessible.



Surveying and preliminary engineering began earlier this year, and a volunteer steering committee formed in the spring. Nearly 800 residents and visitors completed a project survey to help prioritize features and outcomes. Additionally, stakeholder meetings were held with downtown event hosts, city public works and local utility experts, and public safety officials. The data sets from these sources are significant. Narrowing the focus will be an arduous and community-driven process.

Residents, visitors, and local property owners are invited to attend the first public open house on the project September 8th from 5-7PM at Morris City Hall. Consultants from Terra Engineering will share early plans and introduce concepts in order to gather feedback. This is an important step in the planning process. All are welcome and encouraged to attend.
